Disaster Recovery Ministry Updates

Early Response Training

The presence of Early Response
Team volunteers in the
immediate aftermath of a disaster
are critical to the overall recovery
and healing of affected
communities. Their importance
cannot be overstated. We saw
this once again this past year
with Ian, Nicole, and the flooding
in the Ft Lauderdale area. Florida
ERTs were supported by
volunteers from as far away as
California.

The mission of an Early
Response Team is to provide a
caring Christian presence in the
aftermath of a disaster. These
teams are neither a first response
group of emergency workers nor
a recovery rebuild or repair team;
rather they fill a specific need in
the early days after a disaster to
establish the presence of the
church.

Early Response Teams are intended to be small (7 to 12 people), self-sufficient and self-sustaining, with specialized skills for early response. While there are specific tasks assigned to early response teams, no task is more important than the people they serve.

Ongoing Recovery Efforts

Our team is making progress in the Hurricane Ian recovery efforts in Southwest Florida. So far, the funding committee has successfully approved funding for 18 cases. Currently, there are 167 open cases, which include both 2022 tornado and Hurricane Ian survivors. We have also closed 36 cases related to these disasters. We've reached out to and connected with 2280 individuals in need of disaster relief assistance. However, to continue our work effectively, we still require more volunteers, especially for post-summertime efforts. All skill levels are welcome, and volunteers must be over 14 years old.

Your help and support will make a significant impact in helping communities recover and heal from the aftermath of these disasters. While the disaster case manager is there to provide a partnership with the client, the Volunteer and Construction Coordinator is the point of contact for physical repair and volunteer work needs. Our Volunteer and Construction Coordinators are the supervision point for volunteers on site of a client's home.

The success of these training courses marks a milestone in our organization's growth and ability to respond to disasters effectively. We believe that investing in our team's development and fostering strong partnerships are essential in fulfilling our mission to aid and support disaster survivors. Looking forward, we are confident that the skills and knowledge gained during these training courses will enable us to make a meaningful difference in the lives of those impacted by disasters.
